Commodore's Report-by Scott Andrews

Ahoy, Northern California CYA fleet members;

As this season, and my term as Commodore of the Northern California Fleet of the CYA draw to a close, I wanted to share some thoughts on our fleet, and also share our proposed agenda items for the Annual meeting in January, which will be hosted in the Seattle area by the Pacific Northwest Fleet. These meetings are always informative, so if you are interested on how the CYA operates, or just want to be more involved, I encourage you to attend.

This year, the NC Bridge has raised three topics for the annual meeting agenda

- 1. Photo Album Recommend we establish a subcommittee to explore updating the CYA Photo album
- 2. Organizational Structure Proposal to revise the organizational structure of the CYA and Board to more closely match other non-profit corporations. The National level should be composed of a Board of Directors, President, VP, secretary and Treasurer and any other officers that are deemed necessary.
- New Marina Policies Regarding Wooden Boats It
 has been brought to the NC Fleet's attention that
 Safe Harbors, the largest marina management company in the United States, has instructed its harbor-

masters to no longer allow wood hull vessels permanent slip lease contracts regardless of their status or

condition, even with a good survey. This new policy has the potential to severely impact all CYA members. We feel it is important to engage Safe Harbors, and eventually other marinas and marina management companies, and proactively work to reach a mutually acceptable solution.

This year was something of an experiment relative to events. We started the year with a full calendar of events, but several of them ended up being cancelled, either due to unavoidable circumstances, or because of low attendance. Of the events we did hold, some were


We are ending the year in reasonable financial

We are currently installing a sophisticated filtration and water softener facility, and should have high quality water back on the island by the end of October. We are also installing a new wastewater system, which should be completed by the end of November, depending on the weather (if we get into any heavy rains, we may wait on this until spring, since it involves some significant excavation). So, after some trying times, the facility is back in operation.

We are hoping to hold a 100th anniversary rededication event sometime next spring. It would be great to see a fleet of classics on the island for that. I'll keep you all posted.

It has been a pleasure, and an honor to serve the fleet and the greater CYA. I look forward to seeing many of you out on the water!

The meeting was held on September 7th at the Richmond Yacht Club. The agenda of this meeting was to bestow fourteen trophies and awards to winners of the PICYA Youth Sailing Program and other annual regattas sponsored by the PICYA, notably the prestigious Sir Thomas Lipton Series. The meeting was preceded by an excellent power point program on the history of yachting on San Francisco Bay, presented by Ron Young, PICYA Historian of the Year and member of the Saint Francis Yacht Club. The PICYA established uniform rules for racing on S.F. Bay many years ago.

The PICYA Commodore's Ball and Installation of Officers and Directors is scheduled for January 18th also at the Encinal Yacht Club.


Daisy Lewis, granddaughter of Bill Wells, received a scholarship from the PICYA

Those of you who read the Northern California report in the last National Newsletter know that your editor, Patrick Welsh, Tom and Nancy Clothier, George Homenko and Candace Gable, and Steve and Cheryl Kadzielawa once again headed for foreign ports for another river cruise adventure. This year Nancy organized the cruise on a five-cabin yacht from Le Boat on the Rideau Canal in eastern Canada. Our voyage took us from Ottowa to the small town of Smith Falls where the Le Boat facilities are located. We departed early the next morning after arriving in Smith Falls and headed east to Merrickville where we berthed for the night. After touring this picturesque village we turned back to Smith Falls where we pumped out the boat, refilled our water tanks and headed west, upriver.

The Rideau canal, a world heritage site, was completed

in 1832 as for military purposes, as a secure supply route in the event of war with the United States. Later commercial transport became the primary purpose of the canal, that, finally being replaced by the railroad system. Today the canal is most used for recreational boating. the locks operating by hand much as

they did when the canal was first built.

than was the situation in France during our last voyage. The locks were all attended by a number of young men and women who assisted boaters into the locks and went through the drill of closing the gates and opening them after the water levels had been reached. Tying up to the sides of the locks was easier too as the Canadians had

cables that ran from top to bottom where you attached your holding lines. In France you had little help and you had to lasso the cleats on top of the locks to get tied down. This sometimes took a number of throws before you were able to circle the cleat.

The canal itself is really a series of canals that connect a number of small lakes. Once you left one canal you had many choices on where to cruise while you were in the lakes which was nice. Most of the time by being careful you had plenty of depth for navigation. One Le Boat customer wasn't paying attention to the navigational markers and ran aground off a small island. Off to the rescue our larger boat was able to tow the

smaller one off the rocks without any damage and they were soon on their way.


