

Every year I think about how we remember those who sacrificed so much in the name of freedom. As a brother and an uncle, I can only imagine what a family feels when someone so young is called to service by our country. When I travel and I see a young man in uniform I say a silent prayer for his return. My words can't express the feeling that I see on the faces of strangers touched by our "Forget Me Knot Wreath Laying Ceremony". Of equal importance are the WWII Veterans, who are honored as the great generation, and who are dying at a rate of more than 1200 a day. This year's event will have a simultaneous wreath laving event at the confluence of the Mississippi and Missouri Rivers in Grafton. Illinois conducted by Jefferson Barracks Veteran Memorial Cemetery.

Friday September 17th –1800 hrs. (6:00 pm.). At the Marina Club House of the Sacramento Marina there will be a Pot Luck dinner for organizers and participants to meet and greet.

On Saturday, September 18th from 930 hrs. (9:30 am.) to 1500 hrs. (3:00 pm.) in the Marina parking lot the California Auto Museum will sponsor a Car Show with approximately 8-10 cars for public viewing. Refreshments will be available for the organizers and participants in the Sacramento Marina Club House. At approximately 1130 hrs. (11:30 am.) the parade will begin and the Natomas High School Drum Corps will play at the Marina fuel dock for the vachts that are departing up the Sacramento River. The U.S. Coast Guard will escort the regatta of Classic Yachts up river to the confluence of the American and Sacramento Rivers. A decorated Hornblower paddle wheel cruise ship will join in the boat parade, along with the Sacramento Delta Youth Maritime Association. The three Wreath carrying yachts will proceed downstream from the American River, turn after passing the bridge and idle back up stream to position themselves in front of the Rio City Cafe.

The reviewing stand will be on the balcony of the Rio City Café. Individuals present will be the Honor Recipients and guests; members of the US Submarine Veterans; designated members of the Classic Yacht Association; designated members of American Prisoners of War – Department of California: a U.S. Air Force Recruiter; the California Honor Guard: members of the ACFE: members of the U.S. Coast Guard; and designated members from the California Auto Museum, the Sacramento Marina, students from Natomas High School, employees from West Marine; Community Leaders, and the

Event Organizers and Sponsors. At 1245 hrs. (12:45 p.m.) the Color Guard from Natomas High School ROTC will march from the Embassy Suites along the docks and up the ramp and onto the reviewing stand. At 1300 hrs. (1:00 p.m.) The ceremony will begin with the Presentation of Colors. Pledge of Allegiance, and Presentation of Honors. Eight Bells will ring at 1330 -1:30 with the Presentation of the Wreaths for all World War II Veterans, all Veterans, and Special intentions for loved ones of the deceased. The ceremony will close with the California Honor Guard playing Taps.

BOATS IN THE WORKS by Alan Almquist

What ever became of BOUNTY?

Jim Sweeney reports that all structural repairs. modifications, and hull survey are complete. **BOUNTY** left Westmore Marine's dry dock on April 30th and is now berthed at San Rafael Yacht Harbor dock #3 between Tule Ladv and North Star II. The Gray Marine engines and jacket water coolers were landed aboard after the hull was waterborne. Final engine alignment now awaits the receipt of new line shafting components expected to arrive this week. In the meantime the steering system has been reassembled and a new pilot house sole, engine room hatches, water pump foundations, fuel filter foundations, and battery foundations are being fabricated and installed. Reconstruction of propulsion fuel and water piping, engine controls, instrumentation, fire extinguishing, and electrical systems will follow.

IDA MAY, still looking for engines, was towed over to a new covered berth in Loch Lomand in April.

MAGNOLIA DAWN

(1929 Dawn). I recently had an opportunity to see and inspect an in-process restoration of a 45 foot Tri-cabin raised deck cruiser built by Dawn Cruisers, Inc. Not a great deal is known about this boat building company of Clason Point, Bronx, New York City. except that it

was established in 1906 by three members of the Donnelly family, who were active members of the Bayside Yacht Club. In addition to pleasure craft, during the wars the shipyard built boats for the army and small craft for the Navy. The company was acquired by the Wheeler family in 1948 and renamed Wheeler Yachts. The vard was destroyed by fire in 1963. This yacht, while not a member of the CYA, when finished, will be berthed in Alabama. Current restoration is being done in a private warehouse in Greeley, Colorado. The work on the yacht is excellent despite the fact that the wheel house cabin overhead was raised several inches all away around to accommodate the height of the owner and a solid roof was installed over the aft deck. Apparently the boat, in a complete state of disrepair, was purchased for \$1.00. Cost of this restoration is unavailable but the twin V -8 Merc Cruisers that now will power this yacht ran a

I don't know about all Dawn cruisers but this one has very narrow side decks, unlike what we are used to on the Stephens and other yachts of the era. The trade off, of course, are cabin widths probably a foot wider than the other boats.

Unless I missed a few, I found 5 other Dawn yachts in the CYA, listed

by age; *Parader* (38', 1927), *Annette's Rozzy* (42', 1928), *Ono* (48', 1929), *Petral* (48', 1930) and, *Sunrise New York* (45', 1930).

In mid May I was joined by Vice Commodore Patrick Welch and we set out to tour a few of the local boatvards in search of WANDA. Our trek took us to Sausalito, the last known location of the vacht and in the course of things we discovered two other classic yachts that are not members of the CYA. Actually Steve Kadzielawa talked to me about **SARAH B**, a 30 foot, 1951 Stephens sedan cruiser owned and restored by Mike Linder owner of Bayside Boatworks, Inc. in Sausalito. This is a beautiful boat that is a credit to classic yacht preservation, and with an owner who also runs a boatvard. Sarah B should have a long wellmaintained life span.

Wanda was not to be found at Bayside so after our inspection of Sarah B we were directed next door to Richardson **Bay Boat Yard** where Wanda had been hauled and there we talked a bit to yard owner, Ross Summers. He told us that **Wanda** had left the ways in March and had been moved to KKW boat yard in

Richmond

Patrick and I drove over to KKW in Richmond and found Wanda in an open slip with evidence of a lot of maintenance going on. Ross' yard (the same vard that hauled Pat Pending. by the way) had restored the yacht completely from the deck to the keel. The cabin teak was nicely revarnished and all of the hull damage repaired and painted. What is left (and there is a long way to go from here) is the rebuilding of all of the exterior decks, the replacing of the overhead over the rear deck, and the restoration and refinishing of what looks to be the entire interior. Still nothing for the faint of heart. Yet the derelict a few of us saw on the Petaluma River two years ago has come back with a bang. Congratulations to the new owner, Andrew Roettger. We look forward to Wanda rejoining the fleet!
