About our Bridge Meetings

We have an active and productive Bridge and usually have about fifteen members at the meetings. Fleet Commodores, International representatives, Port Captains, event chairpersons, elected and appointed officers, and guests all attend. We review minutes, vote on resolutions, present reports and take care of the items necessary for the operation of our organization. There's a lot going on this year and some of what we do gets published by Alan in Classic Currents and some by Nancy via email, but I thought it might be interesting to try to give all members a feel for some of the other information that is covered in our Bridge meetings.

Community Involvement: We are very active in the local maritime com-

munity and belong to, financially support, and actively participate with other organizations. We belong to and financially support the Delta Chamber, RBOC, and PICYA. We budget around \$1,300.00 per year for these groups. We partner in events and cross pro-


those projects. Some have been completed and some are still being researched.

Finances: Thanks to the good work of Tom Clothier, our previous Treasurer, and continuing support from our current Treasurer, Beverly Par-

tridge, we are in very good financial condition. We have adequate operating funds, cash reserves and a large CD.

New member insert:

One of the ways we help preserve the classic yachting tradition is to recruit new members and encourage them to restore and preserve their vessels. In our last two meetings we decided to concentrate on three primary efforts to expand membership: encourage each current member to recruit one new member, a special project to get ten new members in the Sacramento area, and a new member Application insert that will appear in an upcoming issue of Classic Currents or download one from the website, www.classicyacht.org. If you know of someone with a classic yacht, say hello, tell them about our organization and invite them to become a member. Have them complete the a form with your name as the sponsor and mail it to your Port Captain or the Commodore. It's always fun to meet new members and see their boats. With all our individual efforts we can expand the Fleet and help preserve our maritime heritage.

Historical vessel plaque: Did you know that if you have a wooden vessel built prior to December 31, 1942 that you can apply for a State of California Historic Vessel Plaque to display on your boat? Cost \$20.00. Application forms are available on the CA DMV web site.

Awards: We have received two awards this year. The PICYA has given us a Certificate of Appreciation for our participation in Opening Day, placing ads in their Yacht Club Directory, and other contributions. PICYA offers college scholarships and all our members children are eligible. Contact Dick Engfer for information. The California Heritage Council is presenting us with an award for our efforts preserving and restoring classic vessels.

Events: We've added four events to our 2013 list. The PICYA Wheelchair Regatta in Alameda during September has been added as an Unofficial event. CYA members are encouraged to show up and take a disabled vet on a ride in the Estuary. Cruisin' for Kids in October in partnership with the Potomac has been added as an Official event. This is a fund raising event for the Children's Hospital and Research Center Oakland. Current plans call for the USS Potomac to carry 125 patients/family and ten

CYA member boats flanking the Potomac, and carrying 125 hospital staff and foundation VIPs. Jim Sweeney is having a Lake Tahoe Weekend event in July. All members are welcome to drive up and enjoy the feast. We are hosting the International Change of Watch this year. George Homenko, Susan Takami, and Shawn Ball are organizing this event to be held in January 2014. We're combining our usual December Fleet Change of Watch with the International event, so it's going to be big event and a good chance to meet members from around the country.

Meetings: We have three to four meetings per year. The meetings last about two hours. The next meeting will be in July and we're hoping to have it on the USS Potomac. The meeting format is simple. I try to keep everyone on topic, on time, and make sure everything is covered. Shawn Ball takes the minutes and volunteers for almost everything. Les Cochren keeps us laughing, and George Homenko lets us know when we're off topic or getting too serious. 

Stone's Boatyard, Oakland, CA by Alan Almquist

William I. Stone, from Dartmouth, England, established a boatyard in the Hunter's Point area of San Francisco in 1853, where he specialized in building commercial schooners and tugboats as well as racing and recreational vachts. He was in business until 1892, when his son, Frank, took over, moving the business to Beach Street in Tiburon, at a site where Sam's Anchor Cafe is now. The vard moved to the Harbor View section of San Francisco in 1899, where three vachts were built in the

20-30 ton range: Lady Ida 28t, 1903; Yankee 20t, 1906; Martha 30t, 1907. In 1911, Stone was

evicted from this location and moved to a site at the foot of Diesel Way, in Oakland, adjacent to the Union Diesel Engine Company. Frank's son, Lester, joined the business at this time and the name was changed to W. F. Stone & Son. Then, in 1923,

Frank Stone died and Lester Stone became the sole proprietor. The yard launched three more yachts between 1914 and 1934: Water Witch 17t, 1928; Buccaneer, 1931; Marilyn J 14t, 1934. Finally, in 1942, Stone Boatyard again moved to 2517 Blanding Avenue, in Alameda, where it remains today, building five more yachts in the 15 to 30 ton range beginning in 1949: Alert 30t, 1949; Foxen 14t, 1957; Spartan 10t, 1960; Rowena 18t, 1963. The last yacht, the Dina Maria, at 15



tons was launched in 1970. Lester Stone retired in 1970 and the yard was sold to John Whitset, but continued to do business as the Stone Boat Yard. It declared bank-



ruptcy in 1986 and was sold again, to Bill and Grace Bodle, then again in 2000 to David Olson. The yard closed in 2007, after 154 years of operation. The yard is still active, however, in

the restoration of the 136 foot, Acania, designed by noted naval architect, John H.

Wells and built by Consolidated Shipyards in 1930 for Arthur Wheeler of New York.

After a checkered history of ups and downs, Acania was purchased from Miles Davis who bought the yacht in Florida by David and Lynn Olsen. Acania during her extensive resto-



ration has been berthed continuously at the Stone Boatyard docks.

A Brief History of PICYA is on their website and is a quick read. 109 clubs now belong to the PICYA. This organization was started in 1896 with five clubs. The sixth club ("my") South Bay YC joined in 1897 is now 125 years old and still using its 1903 clubhouse in Alviso. Alviso, you say? Where is that? It is near San Jose at the very south end of San Francisco Bay, which, at one time was a very busy port for freight as well as steamboat passenger service. One such steamboat was the "Jenny Lind" which was enroute from Alviso to San Francisco on April 11, 1853 with about 100 to 130 passengers aboard when a steam "explosion" occurred killing at least 34 people. A monument

marking the 160 years since the tragedy was dedicated in Alviso on April 13.

Opening Day on the San Francisco Bay was Saturday April 28. CYA yachts were in Group 1, as has been the custom, which leads the parade. Opening Day Chair, Vice Commodore Lenora Clark described it as "the largest Opening Day in our history". Rick & Aldeana Saber's "Eagle" took second in "Class 700 Decorated Not to Theme." Oakland YC won Class 400/500 "Flags and Streamers" which habitually has been won by St Francis YC. The PICYA committee boat, the California Hornblower had about 300 people aboard which was



Delta Cruise 2013—July 19-22 by Shawn Ball and George Homenko, Chairperons



The organizers of the 2013 Delta Cruise tell us that this annual event is scheduled to get underway on July 19th and proceed to different Ports of Call through the 22nd (the 22nd is a travel day home). Northern Cali-

fornia CYA yachts will converge on the docks at Suisun Municipal Harbor for the beginning of a great long weekend of fun and good cruising on July, 19th where our Captains are encouraged to arrive as early as they wish. There are no reservations for berthing, as Suisun does not take reservations. However, that weekend is expected to be wide open. Afterwards cocktails and light refreshment will be enjoyed on the docks beginning at 5:30 pm. Everyone will be on their own for dinner, and there are several nice restaurants within walking distance from the docks.

Departure from Suisun will be AM on July 20th with a destination set for the Waterfront Marina in Stockton. Docking in Stockton will be on the Arena side of the harbor, which is much quieter than the Marina side. Access via security carts for transportation to the Marina side where there are restaurants and access to the newly remodeled downtown will be provided. Again late after-

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noon cocktails and light refreshments will be enjoyed dockside, beginning at 5:30. After that a great dinner on the Marina side of the docks has been booked at Nena's Mexican restaurant, with reservations made for 7:00 pm.

The next day the fleet will leave Stockton for a cruise to Oxbow Marina on the Georgiana Slough. The route to Oxbow will be decided in Stockton as there are a number of different ways to get to the mouth of the Georgiana and the 20 minute cruise through the 5 mile per hour zones to Oxbow. George Homenko has made all the necessary arrangements for our docking at the guest docks at Oxbow. All of these berths are individual with fingers on both sides of the yachts and are easy to maneuver into. The cocktail hour will begin whenever followed by a potluck cookout at the close-at-hand picnic area topside. Everyone is requested to bring the main course for their boat and a side dish for four. Desert will be provided by the crew of Sea Gal. The next day (the 22nd) departure from Oxbow will be your leisure depending, of course, on how far you have to travel to get home.

The cost for this trip is \$15.00 skipper fee, \$25.00 per boat for the Stockton Marina and .50 cents a foot per boat at Oxbow (about \$25.00 per boat based on 50' length). On September 21, 2013, at 1:00 pm at the Rio City Cafe in Old Sacramento, we will take time to care for the memory of our veterans. The dictionary defines caretaker as a person who is in charge of a place or thing. Caretaker is a term well suited for our yachtsman on many levels.

On the surface our caretakers work lovingly on preserving their fine classic motor yachts. When one takes a closer look within the NC CYA membership one finds that our caretakers are committed to preserving the waterways and serving as docents in museums caring for history.

While the examples are many, the caretaker example for this article are the many participants of the 8th Annual "Forget Me Knot" memorial wreath laying ceremony. These include The **Del Campo**'s Air Force Junior ROTC (IROTC) which is ranked as one of the top programs in the nation, having achieved Distinguished Unit 23 times, the US Navy Honor Guard, and US Coast Guard and Coast Guard Auxiliary, Sacramento Marina, West Marine and Vets for Veterans Classic Cars.

If you care to take a look

at the sacrifice of the greatest generation, you would find that on June 6th, 1944 the allied troops landed in Normandy. This event marked the beginning of the liberation of Europe from the Nazi yoke. One of the caretakers dear to us, John Flaherty of the Northern California Fleet. as with many others will never forget all of our war veterans and especially the thousands of soldiers who rest on the grounds at Normandy, France. One of the caretakers dear to our fleet works at the garden "Les fluers de la memoir", John Flaherty. Each year caretaker Flaherty sends petals from the garden to be sprinkled along with our "Forget Me Knot" wreaths which were

Another caretaker which has been involved with the Forget Me Knot is Veterans Outreach at Iefferson Barracks. Jefferson Barracks is one of the National Cemetery Administrations oldest interment sites and the burial place for soldiers from all wars. It was built south of St. Louis, Missouri on the banks of the Mississippi Rivers in 1826. Two years before the establishment of the cemetery, the first governor of Missouri, Alexander McNair, was in office. The first governor of Missouri is a relative of our past commodore and former Navy SEAL, Captain Martin McNair.

This year, the Forget Me Knot ceremony will honor the Navy SEALs with a was flown of the US capitol provided by US Senator Barbara Boxer.

Before the Navy SEALS were officially created during the Vietnam War, their roots can be traced back to the the Naval Combat Demolition Units NCDU. On "D" day, June 6th 1944, the NCDU in operation OVERLORD at Omaha Beach, suffered 31 killed and 60 wounded.

As a Sacramento Forget Me Knot caretaker we will harness the currents of the Sacramento river with a special wreath to make the river carry the sorrows of all the lives of loved ones that were lost to her raging waters.

Crusin' for Kids Fundraiser by John Di Lillo



Our first community fundraiser, Cruisin' for Kids benefiting the Children's Hospital & Research Center Oakland was approved at the last Bridge Meeting as an official CYA event. The plan is to put 125 patients and family members on the former Presidential yacht, Potomac, and put another 125 doctors, nurses, and staff from the hospital on some of our member's classic vachts, and take them all on a tour of the Bay. The cruise is scheduled for Saturday, October 19, 2013. The event will provide relief to the families from their daily medical concerns in addition to supporting the CHRCO Foundation. This is our first Cruisin' for Kids and with your support, we hope to make

it an annual event.

The Cruise

We will be leaving the Jack London Square docks at 10:30 for a two and a half hour cruise. This will be a large fleet of, hopefully, thirteen boats with Oakland PD providing Pilot and Chase vessels. We will take the kids under the new eastern span of the Bay Bridge, around Angel Island up to the Golden Gate, down along the San Francisco waterfront, then under the western span of the Bay Bridge, and then back to Jack London Square.

We'll have caterers serving lunch, photographers taking their pictures, docents to help with wheel chairs, and hospital staff available if needed. Additionally the kids will be presented with event watch caps and burgees to take home. It should be an exciting experience for the kids and their families. With your support we can make a difference.

Since this is a new event for our Fleet we want to notify all CYA members now and at the same time give a progress update to the Bridge. This event will be coordinated by Chairman John Di Lillo, Co-Chair Marti Burchell (Potomac), and the Fundraising team of Shawn Ball, Patrick Welch, & Ed Bancroft. We have already received full approval and support from

Children's Hospital. Over ten Oakland business groups, civic organizations, and government agencies are also involved.
