accommodating and the charm of Main Street is steps away from the dock. It is like spending the weekend in fantasy land.





On September 17, 2016 the Northern California Fleet gave tribute to our service personnel who

were captured and to those who are still Missing in Action. We also gave honor to the Holocaust victims and those who were fortunate to survive.

We pay homage to our

veterans several times during the year, but barely a word is mentioned about our still missing veterans. It is their families our hearts should go out to, as they know not where their loved ones lie. We all agree it is easier to live with the death of a loved one than to live every day not knowing where they are, if they are alive and safe and hoping that someday they will return.

Our ceremony was beautiful. There were four wreaths that were blessed on the front steps of the Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament, Cathedral Square, downtown Sacramento by The Very Rev. Father Michael O'Rielly, It is just like a real Italian Duomo. Biographies were read about the Holocaust victims and survivors as

well as Father Jacquez Hamel, whom Isis killed in the Middle East. Our procession moved on to the



Sacramento Marina where we had a time of morning fellowship as our Captains readied their boats for shove off for the wreath laying on the Sacramento River waterfront Old Sacramento.

Once in downtown Old Sacramento the Air Force **IROTC Honor Guard** and the Color Guard as well as the percussions section of the local Natomas High School met us. We gathered at the Old School House for the presentation to the Western Holocaust Educational Museum, the American Flag and a prayer especially written for them. Once again the Holocaust's victim's biographies were read.

Then we moved to the

waterfront where our classic yachts together with ACBS and friends of our organizations proceeded

for the laying of the wreaths. It was a very moving ceremony. Most of us know or have a relative that served in the Armed Forces and that makes this ceremo-

ny special. What a way to remember and to say Thank you for your sacrifice! By the way all the flowers for the wreaths come from France. We also scatter sand from the beaches of Normandy. There was a couple from England that said this event was very moving for them as they lost their Uncle in WW I. I assured them that these wreaths were laid for all service men and women everywhere who fought for the

freedom we enjoy today. God bless our service men and women and God bless the USA.

For 13 years the "Forget Me Knot Allegory" has been a story that has revealed hidden meaning and a journey in which I wanted to share my growth and understanding of the war with our members. We have touched the hearts and souls of many people who lost loved ones or those that served. We tapped into the energy of the youth through parades and music. Our odyssey is chronicled on the internet "YouTube" under the search term Forget Me Knot Sacramento. In memory of the POW/MIA and the Normandy Invasion, may their sacrifices never be forgotten.

Sausalito, takes place the same night as ours does in San Rafael. 

We enjoyed a beautiful Delta sunset on the way back downstream. I would have to say this was one of the most fascinating evenings I have had in a while.

We had too many things going on to bring Ranger to the Stephens Rendezvous at Delta Marina in Rio Vista. We did make it Saturday night to join everyone for dinner at The Point restaurant. The weather was spectacular and I hear there was a

steady stream of visitors dropping by to admire the boats over the weekend. I am excited to hear the change of watch will be at Trader Vic's in Emeryville. My favorite restaurant when I lived in Honolulu 50 years ago was Trader Vic's. I had many enjoyable evenings there. Sacramento had a copy of Trader Vic's from the 1949 through the 1990s it was called the Coral Reef. It was filled with artifacts the Maleville family collected during the 1930s and 40s during their travels to the South Seas and Micronesia. Sue and I look forward to seeing you there!

On the trip to Rio Vista for the Stephens' Rendezvous, MAKOTO had developed a transom leak. This was made worse by a faulty float switch in the mid-ship bilge pump. The result was the unwanted discovery of about 6 inches of water in the bilges, and that sinking feeling that comes with the forward bilge pump coming on every 3 minutes at 4 AM (I know, I timed it, bleary eyed, with my phone!). So the next weekend Susan and I cruised back down Georgiana Slough and made our way to the New Bridge Marina, just under the Antioch bridge. Jose Montano met us on the docks, and

ful!), we moved MA-KOTO a few hundred yards to Bridgehead Marine where they hauled her out using their marine elevator. The elevator is very simple, but also very impressive. It lifts the boat out very gently, with no drama or concern for straps and such.

Mike at Bridgehead found the transom leak, recaulked several seams, repainted the bottom, and replaced the zincs. We were relieved to find that the previous zincs, while somewhat deteriorated, were still reasonably sound after over two years, so that means either Oxbow Marina is not very electrically active, or our galvanic isolator is doing its job!

A few days later, on a very rainy day, we re-floated MAKOTO and saw not an additional drop of water in her bilges! I highly recommend both Jose, who does both teak restoration and brightwork, and Bridgehead Marine, who's elevator is a godsend for our old boats, and who have both the knowledge and appreciation to service these classic yachts.
