CWB is in fact one of the great waterfront treasures that has become an icon here in the Seattle area for just about anyone who wants to avail themselves of the many activities that they have to offer. This years show offered an array of boats which represented just about every type of boat one could imagine. As I pulled up to my assigned slip I immediately had the things were more relaxed and people were not wound so tight - also a time when a person could walk the docks and look at many finely restored vessels each in their own right representing a small slice of maritime history. To say that I was immediately caught up in the ambience of the show was, and is, an understatement. Let me explain -To my immediate right was a finely restored 1921 Hacker Craft speedboat - - to my immediate left were two over the top restored tugs - one of which

was still a working tug on our beautiful South Sound. Just behind me a stunning 1920's era Classic yacht caught my eye as the owner was securing his lines. Just about anywhere you looked there was another feast for the eyes.

There was a vendor section, which offered just about any kind of food one could imagine. I would say that if one took the time to browse thru every exhibit as well as look at all of the vessels - - it would take the better part of a day - - and I almost forgot to mention the variety



The season has begun, more events to attend. And yes, more blue tape in the future as the continual preservation continues.











CAPTAIN DOUG MERY IN MEMORIAL



Classic Yacht Association member Douglas Lloyd Mery of Port Townsend, WA, died on February 13, 2010, in West Hills, CA, of complications from openheart surgery. He was 73. He was born on October 20, 1936, in Gridley, CA, the son of Helen Claire (Lander) and Lloyd Wright Mery.

On May 10, 1975, he wed Rayma Leah Sandom in Las Vegas, NV. Early in his career, Doug worked at the Argonne National Laboratory in Chicago and the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory in California. In the mid-1970's, he began working for General Atomics in San Dicgo, CA. At that time, General Atomics was in the process of building one of the early experimental devices for the Atomic Energy Commission's fusion research program. Doug was among the talented engineers and scientists involved in a \$30 million experimental project, and, according to his family, was invaluable to the program because of his extensive knowledge of magnets. The basic experimental device Doug helped to build is still operational today.

In 1984, Doug was called upon to help design the magnetic resonance imagine (MRI) fabrication facility. He invented and fabricated a wire-flattening device that proved key to the success of the MRI fabrication process.

After retiring from General Atomic, Doug and Rayma moved to Port Townsend. Doug continued to work. During the summers, he and Rayma sailed their 65-foot Canadian Forestry vessel, LILLIAN D, north along the Canadian coast, delivering supplies to isolated villages along the coast of British Columbia. In winter, Doug ran a small business selling and repairing electric motors.

Despite his retirement, Doug continued his involvement with magnets. Former associates often called upon Doug for assistance with difficult fabrication problems. Doug's unique understanding of magnets and building them using wire and epoxy will be greatly missed by his friends and colleagues.

His hobbies included boating on his old wood vessel, ISLAND RUNNER,

which reflected his love of classic boats. He also enjoyed diving, swimming, water skiing, and fishing.

Survivors include his wife, Rayma; stepmother Marie Mery of California; brothers Gordon Mery (Joan) and Richard Hage (Susan) or Oregon; daughters Donna Watt (John) of California and Jamie Goodenough (Paul) of Whidbey Island, WA; and seven grand-children.

A memorial service was held aboard ISLAND RUNNER on Sunday, July 11, to return his remains to the ocean he loved. A celebration of life followed at the Port Townsend Yacht Club.
