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The annual general meeting is required by the Regulations and Procedures of the PNW Fleet. We are required by V Article to elect bridge officers for the upcoming year during the annual general meeting. We also conduct routine business such as review and approval of meeting minutes from the previous year and review and approval of a budget for the upcoming year. Typically, we also discuss topics of interest in our fleet as well as topics that our fleet wants to forward to The Classic Yacht Association for their consideration in their annual meeting in January.

We conducted the following business during this years' PNW annual general meeting:

- Unanimously voted in favor of accepting the 2020 meeting minutes.
- Unanimously voted to approve a budget of approximately \$23,750.00.
- Unanimously voted in favor of the slate of bridge officers and CYA fleet directors as illustrated in the below table. Changes for 2022 are indicated in red font.

- Voted to moving the following proposals forward to the Classic Yacht Association ("The Association") for discussion in their 2022 annual meeting:
 - O Proposal to consider a new article for the CYA bylaws. That proposal that essentially states....

 Members shall not display political or for-profit endorsements, FOR SALE signs at CYA events.

 CYA information shall not be used by members for profit or personal gain. Any indication of endorsement of the Classic Yacht Association, or use of the Classic Yacht Association burgee by a third-party in advertising is strictly forbidden without prior written authorization of the Board of Directors.
 - O Proposal to consolidate all fleet newsletters into one CYA-wide quarterly document.
- Unanimously voted in favor of adopting the Legacy Fund proposal. The idea for the Legacy Fund was conceived by a team of PNW Fleet members who were interested in finding a way to sustainably and effectively use approximately \$25,000 generated during past-years' auctions to meet the educational and charitable objectives of Classic Yacht Association (See page 89 of the 2021 roster). This \$25,000 has been held unused in a certificate of deposit for more than a decade.

The Legacy Fund proposal states......Each year, no more than \$1000 will be set aside from The Legacy Fund for promoting the educational and charitable purposes of our Objectives. Any unused amount may carry over to the following year. The Legacy Fund will be replenished with donations from the PNW Fleet's fundraising efforts in amounts determined by the Bridge. The Fleet Treasurer would be responsible for managing the Legacy Fund in a prudent manner to minimize risk and maximize return.

After voting to approve the Legacy Fund, PNW members brainstormed how to spend \$1,000 in 2022. Most of the ideas centered around providing grants or scholarships to organizations or students pursing maritime trades including wooden boat building and repair skills.
