Old Fashioned Days in the Park 2006





So as you can see, Marina Pacifica runs the gamut of what's important in the summertime to a classic boater.








Hello to the Clarence and Roma Shoemaker. The Shoemakers are renewing old members and have member number 99.

JOAN M. HEN-DERSON, at one time, was used by the Coast Guard, for extensive underwater mapping (hydrographic survey) of Catalina Island.




