
"Sobre las Olas" Hosts '07 Opening Day

SEADOG Stumbles into 2nd Log Race Victory

The yachts; COMOCEAN, RIPTIDE, MADRIGAL, SEADOG, AND MINDFUL accompanies by a couple of dozen guests, competed in the Southern Fleets third annual Predicted Log Race. Saturday morning dawned clear and warm for this years event. After coffee and muffins and a short board meeting onboard RIPTIDE, course maps were handed out and the brain work began. Every skipper/navigator took a time measuring and calculating what their predicted times would be over the four course legs that made up the race route. Top speed is not important, but following the course exactly, at the speed one predicts, theoretically gets you home at exactly the time you anticipated. This is done all without navigation equipment or the aid of a clock.

This years event took us out of Cabrillo Marina past the first marker, a green channel buoy, which was to also be the end of the course. From there it headed into the San Pedro channel past Ports-o-Call and to the second mark at the bow of Honorary CYA member the LANE VICTORY. Second leg was the longest back out of the same channel and into the open harbor behind the Federal Breakwater. This leg had it's end marker near the Long Beach Light at the seawall opening about 7 miles away. Again an about face then back along the inside of the seawall to third checkpoint near the Angels Gate light and finishing where it started right outside of the entrance to Cabrillo Marina.

This was a fun course because it was a bit longer then previous years which allowed for a comfortably long harbor cruise. An unintended consequence of all of the differences of speed and the reversal of directions was that boats were regularly passing each other going opposite directions. This made for some fun photo ops and allowed for a lot of waving and playful taunting of ones competitors. The Classic Yachts looked wonderful as they cruised bye going the other direction. A dockside barbecue followed upon returning to port.


SEADOG eventually won the event with and unbelievable total time error of only seven seconds. This came as a big surprise to Jim and Hawk and even myself. As I had been time keeper on that yacht and had watched them struggle hopelessly throughout the day. They had made a gross miscalculation on the first and second legs forgetting that the maximum speed in the San Pedro Channel was 5 knots then hastily recalculating. They were way out of line and I guess equally way out off on other legs too. I

suppose one set of errors washed the other and the end result proved to be correct. Having seen how far off they





I think their victory supports the wise old saying, "I'd rather be lucky then good!"




Want to save the unused 5200 ? Save the cut-off tip and shove it into the open end. Works better that tape.


From Tom Brown, He also suggests wrapping your varnish brush in foil and putting it into the freezer overnight. Keeps it fresh for the next days work.
