

Press Release

The Classic Yacht Association has as its primary purpose the promotion of the preservation, restoration and maintenance of fine, old, power-driven pleasure craft. There are over 350 members making up five fleets including Southern California, Northern California, the Pacific North West, Alaska and the USA fleet.

At its annual meeting in January 2008 in Long Beach California, the CYA approved a resolution changing the constitution and by laws to reflect an international character.

In keeping with that goal, International Commodore David Gillespie is proud to announce the granting of a new charter to the **CANADIAN FLEET**. There are currently 20 members of the fleet with vessels ranging in age from the 1913 classic Charles H. Cates to the vintage 1952 Chris Craft, Gin Fizz.

The formation of the new fleet was led by International Rear Commodore Mike O'Brien from Victoria, and Pacific North West fleet Staff Commodore, Canada, Bob Shaw from Vancouver. A first annual meeting at which a Bridge will be elected is planned for the fall of 2008.

Membership in the Canadian fleet is open to all residents of Canada who are owners of Classic or Vintage yachts as defined in the CYA by-laws which are available on the web site at www.classicyacht.org.






of the rail system, America's waterways were swarming with ferries of all nature. Roads, cars, and carriages were so uncomfortable that the civilized way to travel anywhere was on the water. These ferries flitted about on our waterways like a swarm of mosquitoes above a pond, thus the term "mosquito fleet" was born. The most amazing thing about what I had read was that at one time America had 256,000 steam ferries buzzing around our lakes, rivers, and ports. Now there are only two left that are operational, the Virginia V and one on the East coast.

Amazing! *** Jim and Hawk recently were invited up to Friday Harbor, WA, by new SEADOG owner Les Gunther. They got to see the progress on the refitting of SEADOG. She is completely gutted and is getting new engines and interior. A great yacht getting even better. *** Peter and Dennis's first boat Ripple V has recently been broken up. With Bob's leadership the original thirteen charter members formed the CYA in 1970 to promote and encourage the preservation of fine, old, power-driven pleasure craft.

Bob was so pleased with the growth and continued interest in CYA. He realized that although responsible for planting the seed, hundreds of other classic boaters have been responsible for the growth of the organization. Bob will be missed, but what a legacy he has left behind. Every restored classic yacht owes him a debt of gratitude. Ten or twenty...err, why not fifty years from now his name will still be remembered in connection with the CYA and classic boating. We should all be so lucky.
















Opening Day 2008



Bill Erving Memorial Cruise









Earlier this year my good friend Bill Erving passed away. Sad yes, but after his debilitating aneurism and his extended hospitalization with very little quality of life, it was his time. I was not alone in having Bill as a friend. Many of us would say the same thing. Although a quiet man he was friendly and had a certain charisma that made people like him. He was easy to like. He was real. There was never an arrogance about him. Even his drink of choice Budweiser was straightforward. Bill was often seen with a can of Bud in his hand. Even that was an endearing trademark.

During Bill's last year, being hospitalized without any ability to think or reason and with no ability to take care of himself, certain instinctive reactions were noticed. Anna found that he still liked looking at boating magazines. Sometimes he couldn't turn the pages but he would stare at the photos and seem to enjoy them like something deep down still remembered. One of my favorite stories, as told by Dennis Ballard, was of a time when they put a can of Bud in his hand and when Dennis lifted his can bill reacted instinctively by lifting his. One wonders what his damaged mind really could understand.

I know that Bill would have been happy with his farewell cruise. It was a beautiful spring morning with lightly rolling, glassy seas. The ocean sparkled as the classic yachts ran happily through it. We all rounded the L.A. light and passed through the Angel's Gate and out to the open ocean. Although thinking of Bill, it was hard not to be joyous on a day like that. It was an appropriate way to say goodbye to a fine yachtsman. Many of us will have trouble passing the L.A. Light without pausing for a moment and remembering our friend Bill Erving.






