


We did it! With a little help from the weatherman.







yachts over. It was a special treat to have boats for our guests to visit and relax on.































SCUTTLEBUTT

Alura II was purchase by Paul and Sandy Fredricks from Thousand Oak, and the boat was moved to Channel Island Marina. Anna bought them a CYA membership as part of the sale and they attended the National Change of Watch banquet as Anna's guests. Neat people I hope many of you got a chance to meet them and I hope that they will make their way to some of our other 2008 events. This is their first boat and I'm sure they will need some mentoring. "It can be a small world". On Saturday afternoon during the Change of Watch, Stan Nelson from Seattle asked if I could do him a favor. He wanted to look at a boat that he had seen listed for sale. It was a 50 foot Bertram Cruiser that had been a personal boat of Richard Bertram when it was new and used by him for cruising in Europe. Stan had always wanted a Bertram of this design. Elissa, He and I, and his wife Robin, went and met the broker. We drove and then walked onto the dock and to the vacht's slip. As I reached the boat and saw the name "Namaskar" and realized that I new this boat. I had photographed it a few years back as part of a photo shoot I did for the Long Beach Yacht Club. "Namaskar" was in the goodbye fleet when the 'Deerleap" left for Seattle. When we went inside, there on the table was a CYA Photo Album and several of my pictures. It seems

that Richard Gardner had done much of the interior woodworking on a recent refit and at that time made sure owner "Karen"had a Photo Album. What a pleasant coincidence.

"The Terrible Loss of DOROTHEA". For those of you that attended last years Change of Watch is Seattle, there was a presentation given by long time CYA member and Project manager for "Motor yacht Dorothea" Malcolm Munsey. Dorothea was undergoing an extensive and very professional refit including a whole new interior. She was getting new tanks, all new wiring, new plumbing, complete engine rebuilds, complete paint, and more. Several CYA members were involved. Built by Vic Franck's Yard in 1967, the 107 foot Dorothea is all wood and had clocked over 150,000 mile while going completely around the world. On Friday, November 2nd, Dorothea met with a horrible tragedy. 220 miles off the coast of Costa Rica she caught fire and was abandon by her crew of five when the fire became hopeless. The fire started deep below deck and spread up her mast and engulfed the bridge. The Captain worrying about propane tanks and 400 gallons of gasoline near the mast, plus 7000 gallons of diesel below decks, ordered the crew into the life boats. He said, "When you step off a boat 220 miles off of Central America, there is only one thing on your mind, you're dying". Sensing two locator beacons, the Coast Guard diverted two drug intervention aircraft who were nearby. One plan spotted the burning yacht and the lift rafts. They were picked up first by a Panamian fishing trawler and then seven hours later transferred to the frigate USS HALYBURTON. None of the crew were injured. Not only was this a loss for those directly involved, it was a loss for the whole Seattle boating community. Dorothea was the largest vacht to ever come out of the Lake Union Vic Franck vard and a fixture in Seattle boating.





A Day of Classic Yachting on the Tigre River

In December, I had the good fortune to visit the wonderful city of Buenos Aires, Argentina. I was invited as the guest of Mario Iocolano and his wife Veronica to stay with them in their home in the Recoleta section of that great city. Through Mario's family connections, I spent a great deal of time at the Yacht Club of Argentina (YCA), both in Buenos Aires and in the suburb of San Ysidro.

While at YCA San Ysidro, I was invited by one of the members, Coco Jensen, to spend a day with his family on their 47' 1947 classic powerboat. Coco is actually a world class small boat sailor, who bought the powerboat looking for comfort and speed when he was not sailing.

Mario, Veronica and I arrived at YCA bright and early on a sunny Sunday morning and went to the appointed meeting place, a dock located within the 100 acre yacht club owned property. Several large wooden classics went by without stopping. Finally, the most beautiful boat in the harbor approached, with Coco at the helm. We stepped aboard, made introductions (including a pair of Scotties named "Port" and "Starboard", one with red collar, one with green), and set off for the Tigre River. It did not take long to see just how special this yacht is. She had been totally restored at the yard owned and operated by the YCA (which has a full-time staff of 100). New turbo Yanmar's give her a cruising speed of 20 knots and a top speed of an astonishing 30 knots. At 20 knots, it was so quiet in the cockpit you could carry on a normal conversation, although since everyone else spoke Spanish, I didn't have a clue what was being said most of the time. As we turned a corner in the channel, we entered the Tigre River. Coco served champagne and tradi-

tional empanadas (a meat turnover which is a staple in the Argentine diet).

There are literally hundreds of branches of the river, with mile after mile of cottages lining both sides. There are no roads and groceries are purchased from barges that pull right up to the docks. These cottages were built years ago for people to escape the heat of the city. Mario spent childhood summers on the river, and he still loves it.

We tied up for lunch at "Aku Aku", a riverside bistro with docks. Ten of us had a full meal, including wine and dessert, for less than \$100.00US. The food was great, and as is the style there, lunch lasted over three hours. You can't be in a hurry there, rushing is not a concept that is understood or tolerated by the locals.

Lunch ended, and we returned to our boat. By late afternoon, traffic was heavy on the river. We had to back away from the dock quickly, and the props stirred up a huge cloud of mud. Turns out the river runs between two and five feet. Most boats in that section draw as little as 18 inches. Good thing that it is so protected.

We raced back to YCA at almost 30 knots, throwing a HUGE wake, which most of the locals appeared not to notice. Yachting is like driving a car down there. You go as fast as you ca, turn when you like and



seem not to notice anyone else. All in all, I can't wait to go back and do it all over again!

Note: The Yacht Club of Argentina has several thousand members and is a world class yacht racing organization. It has a huge private harbor and facility including it's own boat yard as pictured below. YCA has it's own division for owners of historic power boats.




GRACIE






