



The Summer is over and Autumn is here already. Where did the season go? We have all been affected by the fires this season and our boats have been great refuge from the smoke. July was a busy month for our fleet, as we readied our boats for back-to-back events. Old Fashioned Day in the Park is Los Angeles County sponsored and our boats are open to the public that last Sunday of July. By late Saturday our fleet numbered 9 for this event. Gracie, Riptide, Sparkle, Enchantress, Sobre Los Olas, Hel -Port II, Intensive Care, Mindful and Black Jack were at the docks. Saturday evening saw the fleet spread down the dock as we barbequed and drank Rick Olson's latest drink creation. Scott and Linda Robinson worked very hard to make this a great event. Situated on the prime dock were Riptide, Gracie and ComOcean, flanked by our new members Kevin and Claudia Murphy's Arrivederci, and Enchantress. To all of us on the dock, we found the loud speakers playing new age jazz all night a little much, and I used a trusty can of WD40 to silence the squealing dock rollers. We were all invited to Shoreline Yacht Club for a cocktail party and dinner Saturday night. After a great dinner, results of the yacht club judging were presented. To nobody's surprise, Ron and Cathy Yatch's ComOcean took a very well deserved first place, while Scott and Linda Robinson followed with their Century taking 3rd place.

Shortly after this event I visited Tom Brown at St. Joseph's Hospital in Burbank. I filled him in on fleet events and his spirit was good. 

The season ends with the sad news of Staff Commodore Tom Brown' passing over the bar. His kind smile and merry demeanor will be missed by all of us.


I'll close now by saying what an honor it is to serve as your Commodore, through the good times and the bad.

TOM BROWN 1935-2009



Tom Brown was married for 53 years to his sweetheart, Peggy. Their happy union produced three kids, son Tom Jr. and daughters Lori and Judy. Born on January 23rd, 1935, he passed over the bar September 17th, Tom served as a negotiator and consultant for the Teachers Union from which he retired about 15 years ago. Besides being one of the best yachtsmen around, Tom was a aircraft pilot and built two planes in his Burbank garage. His building expertise went beyond planes, as he finished 2



homes and a large cabin. We all knew of Tom's navigation skills and that he was a wonderful caretaker of his pride Madri-


gal, but few knew his talents went far beyond that. He was an avid sailor, and restored a wooden classic sailboat while working on Madrigal. He flew his planes in the Mohave Desert and had a few close calls. After retirement, Tom became interested in boat modeling and made several plank-on-frame models. His model of the H.M.S. Bounty is truly of museum quality. His craftsmanship was also remarkable in the instrument box with an inlaid veneer compass rose he created for Madrigal's helm. Our Tom Brown was truly a self reliant all around stand up guy.



Over the last ten years, we all have been privileged to have him in our midst, and serving with him in the CYA was a true pleasure. At our National Change of Watch in 2008, Tom was instrumental as fleet Commodore in making every thing happen smoothly. When asked to be rear commodore in 2005 he told me that it was his turn to volunteer. It was only his failing health that kept Tom from joining us these last months. Always ready with a quick joke, or a story that



had a humorous take on a situation, Tom was a local CYA hero. Like Martie Butz, Scottie Dobson and Erving before him, his smile will be missed around the CYA Southern Fleet.







OLD FASHION DAY in the PARK


guys on a diet?). We all missed the concert in the park that we have been privileged to enjoy the last couple of years, and hopefully next year our date will coincide with their schedule and we


bers open their doors to us and show us a good time. Each year seems to get better then the last as we all learn what seems to "work" the best









Marina pacific is all about relaxing. Summer is starting to wind down and the calm water of the Marina Pacific Channel just seem to lend them-




*** Rob Blayden is now also going through cataract surgery. When we

DON KENNEDY, Holiday Harbor, Wilmington




ARRIVEDERCI—1966
