

DENNIS BALLARD & PETER RIESS

A Tribute to Two Fine Gentlemen And Classic Yachtsmen





Member "All-Stars", Peter Riess and Dennis Ballard have made a serious contribution to CYA and especially to the Southern California Fleet. I suspect that their impact on the CYA isn't over yet. As new members of the Pacific Northwest Fleet they and their awesome yacht RIPTIDE will undoubtedly become important members there too.

In 1997 Peter and Dennis came to their first CYA event at Marina Pacifica long dock. They had a cute 1941 34 foot Chris Craft named RIPPLE V which they had just finished restoring. I'm not sure who made the initial contact with them but I suspect it was the Medranos as their yacht ONO was berthed not far from where RIPPLE V was being kept. Peter and Dennis hosted members on and off Ripple V during the weekend, and it became obvious that they were charming hosts and immediately liked. Little did we know that we were meeting two guys that would become such important "players" in CYA.

During the 1998 National Change of Watch held on the Queen Mary "Scottie Dobson- National Commodore", they paraded with the Southern Fleet boats and seemed to really be taken in by being part of the CYA. Peter had grown up on the East Coast and been involved in yachting and yacht clubs with his father since a little boy. It wasn't long before these guys were attending every event and every board meeting. Their influence in how the club was being run became apparent when Peter decided to run the chairs of the bridge officers in 1999. He became Rear Commodore, then Vice and our Fleet Commodore in 2001. Following those successful years he was nominated to the national bridge and 3 years later became National Commodore at the Change of Watch in 2004 held in San Pedro at the Los Angeles Yacht Club. Peter also served as National Director for the SC Fleet for many years.

Dennis followed suit by becoming SC Fleet Rear-Commodore in 2002, Vice in 2003, and SC Fleet Commodore in 2004. In 2001 he convinced Rick Olson to become co-authors with him for the now famous CYA photo album. The photo album project had been bouncing around









the CYA for ten years. San Francisco fleet members, and the subsequently PNW fleet members had attempted to complete a book on all

the yachts of the CYA. In 2001, after much arm twisting by Dennis, Rick Olson and Dennis Ballard proposed to the National board meeting in Sausalito that they be allowed to take on the project. Rick Olson, knowing how hard the job would be, was heard to say that the worst thing that the board could say was "yes". Two years later, in 2003, Dennis and Rick presented a completed hard bound book to the national meeting. Dennis was the major history and picture gatherer and his tenacious persistence made that book happen. He sent over 1500 e-mails and countless phone calls in the process of gathering data. In addition he and Peter traveled extensively going to other fleet events and making many new friends

In 2009 Dennis agreed to become fleet commodore for the 2nd time and now is in the midst of his 3rd term at the helm of the Southern California Fleet. These are compassionate, friends in need, kind of guys. This was most obvious while watching how they helped out during the sicknesses and passing of or members Bill Erving, Scottie Dobson, and Tom Brown. Peter and Dennis are kind men with a lot of heart who have made friends throughout the entire CYA organization.


If all this management wasn't enough. They took on RIPTIDE as a project. Purchased around the millennium, the 60 year old RIPTIDE was a basket case. Gray and unkempt she had been neglected for years and pieces of dry-rotted wood were falling off of her. The common reaction they got was "have you lost your minds". As the month of hard work rolled by she actually came back to life. Every time we saw her she was appreciably better. Dennis's wood craft and Peter's will power pulled her up from the brink to the fine working yacht she is today.

It wasn't long before RIPTIDE was host to breakfasts, parties, cruises, meetings, and fun. She is not a museum piece, she is a boat that is used every weekend. RIPTIDE has been the fleet and

We will miss RIPTIDE and we will miss you both so much.








































Los Angeles Fire Boat #2 — Provided a great water show for us as we paraded down the San Pedro main channel






